KingsWay Middle School provides a Christ-centered education for students in Years 7 to 9, the emerging and early adolescent years. It is our belief that these are crucial years in a child's life; a time of rapid growth in their social, physical, emotional and spiritual development. This belief is supported by research that shows the different needs of students in their middle years compared to primary and secondary students.

Middle School allows students to continue their schooling with homeroom-based teaching where they are supported by one main teacher. Students consolidate skills learnt in Primary and develop a greater level of competency in Middle School, preparing them for Junior Secondary. Our teaching programmes are designed with early adolescent students in mind while ensuring all students are catered for.

We encourage all Middle School students to engage fully with their learning, take opportunities, develop relationships, and grow as followers of Jesus Christ.

This booklet serves to provide general information and to answer some of the questions you might have about KingsWay Middle School. More specific information will be provided through email and website updates later in the year.

Communication

We value communication as this supports our community to work well together. Parent partnership is one of the foundation stones of KingsWay School. Keeping open and honest communication lines is paramount to achieving this goal. As staff we endeavour to return correspondence within 24 hours between 8.30 am and 5pm.

- If the issue is more serious or confidential the Homeroom teacher can arrange a meeting with the person most appropriate to the context.
- Please make an appointment if you wish to see a teacher. This can be done by emailing the teacher involved and agreeing on a mutually acceptable time. Unfortunately, we cannot do impromptu meetings before or after school.
- If you wish to make an appointment with a Dean, please contact the relevant Dean by email.

- If you wish to make an appointment with a school counselor, you can contact them by email.

- * Year 9 students take four option subjects. Each subject area is offered on a semester basis. Students complete two options in Semester One and two in Semester Two.

Please note: Every effort will be made to ensure as many as possible of the students' option subject preferences are met. Due to restrictions on class sizes, students may not necessarily be placed into all their top four option preferences. Not taking an option subject in Year 9 does not exclude your child from taking it in the future.

Assessments

The primary purpose of assessment is to identify progress and next learning steps. Teachers use a range of assessment types and equip students to interpret these for goal setting and reflection.

Reporting to Parents

We want you to know how your child is achieving at school. Teachers communicate with parents when needed throughout the year.

Formal reporting processes include:

End of Term 1 Parent/teacher conferences – goals focus

End of Term 2 Mid-Year Reports

Term 3 Parent/teacher conferences – progress focus

Term 4 End of Year Reports

Parents are required to attend the Full School Parent Meeting in Term 1 and the Middle School Parent Meeting in Term 4.

Home Learning

We provide Home Learning to reinforce concepts being learnt at school and to support student development of study habits.

- Home Learning is generally given on a Monday and expected to be completed by Friday of the same week.
- Students are expected to complete 45-60 minutes of Home Learning each week. If your child struggles to complete Home Learning in the allotted time, let the teacher know.
- Specialist subject teachers may also issue Home Learning at times.
- Please check that your child completes their Home Learning each week.

Digital Devices at KingsWay School

BYOD (Bring Your Own Device)

Middle School students have the option to bring their own digital device.

Our aim is for our students to be educated using a blended approach with digital technologies being an integrated part of their learning. Through having access to their own device, students will experience new learning opportunities that are more relevant, collaborative and personalised. 21st Century learning aims to prepare our students to be servant leaders in this age by providing them with a range of knowledge and skills which are enabled by the use of digital technologies.

Safety

- It is important to us that our students use devices safely for the protection of our student body. For this reason, we have set measures in place.
- All students and parents are required to read and sign the KingsWay School Cyber Safety Agreement. Students sign a Student Use Agreement in order to have permission to bring your own device.
- All internet access must go through the school Wi-Fi. This will be monitored for inappropriate or excessive use.
- No VPNs are allowed to bypass the firewall.
- Students are issued with a personal wireless access key whereby their activity is visible and tracked. All students will take part in a digital citizenship programme to make them aware of digital etiquette and the dangers of inappropriate use of digital information and social networking. Monitoring software will be used at school.
- KingsWay School believes open communication between parents, teachers and students is the best way to keep students safe.
- If you have any concerns about internet safety, contact the school or visit:
 http://www.netsafe.org.nz. Experience has taught us that the best protection against inappropriate behaviour is to provide students with the skills and heart attitude to self-regulate.
- Cell phones are not permitted to be used within school hours. On rare occasions teachers may allow their use in class for learning.

Digital Devices at KingsWay School

BYOD devices brought to school need to adhere to the specifications below:

Tablets, iPads and cellphones are not suitable devices for BYOD at KingsWay School.

Mac laptops are acceptable. For Year 9-13 these need to be the latest MacOS to support and work with Office 365 Apps and subject dependent software like Creative Cloud.

If prices is prohibitive, parents are encouraged to consider refurbished or ex-lease laptops that meet the specifications.

Wellbeing

Our Wellbeing Team works to proactively support our young people. An example of this is our mentoring programme. This team also works alongside students who need support with decision making.

Restorative Practice

At KingsWay School relationship is at the heart of everything we do, therefore we have a Restorative Practice discipline system. 'The Restorative Practice model focuses on building and maintaining positive, respectful relationships across the school community' and 'uses tools and techniques that aim to restore relationships when things go wrong' (TKI). These tools can include boundaries and consequences. The biblical foundation for this is that God restores and redeems.

We Aim For:

- Improvement in relationships (student/God, student/student, student/teacher, student/community) and attitudes
- Personal responsibility and accountability for behaviour
- An awareness of the impact of actions on others and the need to put things right
- Personal growth and heart change
- High expectations for learning and behaviour
- A consistent approach across the school community

Reflect / Repair / Restore



Student Responsibilities

Students are expected to do their best and are responsible for achieving their maximum learning potential. Students are responsible for obeying the school policies, procedures, and rules.

Student Decision Making

Key to the development of students is their ability to make good decisions. Students are expected to grow and develop in their ability to make positive choices which includes how they present themselves and participate in learning.

Students make choices that consistently ensure:

- The safety, respect, and care (physically, emotionally, spiritually, and intellectually) of themselves and others
- Respect for personal property and the property of others
- A peaceful learning environment

Where student decision making negatively impacts personal well-being, the well-being of the others and the well-being of the community the observing teacher will address, monitor, and record the incident. The level of impact of the behaviour determines if it is a teacher, Head of Learning, Dean, Senior Management Team member or Associate Principal who follows the Restorative Practice process.

The Head, Heart and Hands framework is used to support students in making good decisions and is in response to negative, undesirable, and unacceptable behaviour.

- Head: Students will participate in activities that enable them to reflect and learn from the decisions they have made based on the school values.
- Heart: Students will participate in activities that enable them to restore relationships. Here the Restorative Practice norms of the school may be used.
- Hands: Students will participate in activities that are supportive of the school community in a positive way. Students will engage in community service.

Student Learning

Students are to take responsibility for their own learning and support a positive learning environment. Basic expectations include being organised for learning, being punctual, completing learning tasks on time and being a positive influence in all learning environments.

Expectations for Student Learning:

- Being positive requires the student to be a positive influence in class so they and all students are able to learn without distraction and disturbance.
- Organisation requires the student to: set and meet realistic personal goals; have all required subject materials before each class starts; be changed in time for PE, Sports, PFA and Dance classes and use the toilet during the breaks.
- Punctuality requires the student to be present: by the second bell for the start of school, at the end of interval and lunch; and/or for line up. Where a student is not on time this is reflected as 'late' on the roll.
- Meeting time expectations for Home Learning and set tasks is an expectation for all students to manage and meet.

Student Presentation

Students will be expected to present themselves appropriately in a range of situations and community environments that depict maturity, self-control and respect for themselves, others and the school.

Expectations for Uniform Presentation During the School Day:

- Tidy and correct uniform for the school activity and time of the year according to school definitions and expectations.
- Students wearing specific clothing for Performing Arts, Dance and the PE uniform for the required class or class activity will be required to change into uniform during morning tea and lunch. Period 5 and 6 students may leave school in subject clothing and shoes.
- Students arriving to school are to present themselves in school day uniform.
- Tidy and correct uniform presentation is required for all assemblies.
- Mufti days allow students to present in clothing that supports modesty as well as non-offensive language and symbols, without restricting participation in everyday school activities (for example PE).

Expectations for Uniform Presentation Outside the School:

- Tidy and correct school day uniform is required for all activities based outside the school.
- Activity specific presentation is allowable if approved (for example: sport events, zone days, service days).
- Where a sport uniform is required to participate in a school event, it is not to be modified or mixed without permission.


Recognition

Annual Activity and Subject Costs

The activity and subject costs that parents incur for the year are collated into a single document detailing the costs.

Camp Costs

Camp costs are in addition to the year's Activity Costs and are due prior to each camp. Below are the camps we run in Middle School. Costs for the camps will be confirmed closer to the time of each camp.

Special Character Donations

KingsWay School also requests a Special Character Donation of \$636.00 per annum.

This allows us to provide personnel and resources in line with our special character.

Although it is not compulsory it is absolutely vital to our survival. Not only does it provide resources to implement the 'Christian worldview' (Special Character) in all we do, but it also supplements what we receive from government funding so we can add value to such things as ICT developments, subsidise programmes, provide additional staffing and resources and develop initiatives in sport, art and cultural activities.

The Special Character Donation is an ongoing donation and can be paid into this account number: 12-3084-0192348-00. This is an automatic payment set up and controlled by the parents themselves.









Student Absences

Reporting a student's absence for sickness

It is a Ministry of Education requirement to have a written explanation of a student's absence. When your child is absent from school the school must be notified. You can do this by:

- Email: absences@kingsway.school.nz
- Leave a message on the absentee line: 09 427 0900 and enter 1 to leave your absentee message. Please state your name, your child's name and class and reason for absence.
- School App: To download the app, go to the App Store on your Apple or Android device and search SchoolAppsNZ. After downloading, open the app and search for KingsWay School. Once KingsWay School has been selected, your app will automatically open to the KingsWay School platform from now on. Select the 'Absentee' icon on the app. Select email and type in the details for your child. Click send.

If the absence is for more than one day, please advise this in your message. If your child is absent from school for more than 5 days due to ill health, a medical certificate is required.

Students leaving early or arriving late to school

Students leaving early or arriving late* must sign in/out using the Vistab electronic tablet in the library and bring a note/appointment card explaining the absence if an email has not already been sent to the school ahead of the absence.

*Students are required to be at school by 8:40am each morning

Students who become sick, or injured during school hours

Students must report to the Health Centre. Only when a parent or caregiver has been contacted by the Nurse or office staff will the student be released. Students are NOT to text parents/caregivers to collect them from school.

Extra family holidays or other absences that are not sickness related

Parents are asked to try and plan their family holidays during the set school holidays. Requests for special leave during the school term should be directed to the Deputy Principal of Middle School in writing by emailing the Middle School Administrator: msadmin@kingsway.school.nz

Home Schooling

We cannot support regular days at home from school for the purposes of 'Home School'. The Ministry of Education has specific processes and requirements around home schooling.

Attendance Requirements from the Ministry of Education

Schools are required by the Ministry of Education to keep an accurate record of student attendance and to follow up on all student absences and lateness with parents and caregivers. Absences are then classified as "Justified" or "Unjustified". All "Unjustified" explanations count towards truancy. If no reason is provided for a student's absence, it is coded as "Unjustified" and counts towards truancy. Examples of "justified" absences: "Pete had a dentist appointment" - documentation verifying the appointment in the form of an appointment card or similar must accompany the explanation. "Mary has been in bed with a bad cold" - a medical certificate may be requested for illness absences longer than five days.

Uniform

Please ensure your child has correct uniform at all times. If there is a non-regulation item of uniform worn on any day, for a valid reason, then a note of explanation is required from a parent/caregiver addressed to the Dean for approval.

Girls Uniform

- Navy knee-length school skirt or school trousers
- Blue school blouse
- School jumper or school jacket
- Black flat sandals (back strap compulsory) or black polishable shoes with white knee-high socks, black opaque tights/stockings or plain white ankle socks (no boots, sports shoes or casual shoes)
- Plain scarf: Black, white, or navy

Girls: Hair and Jewellery

- Hair styles for girls need to be neat and tidy and off the face
- Hair ties and bands: Black, white, or navy blue (no patterns)
- Only natural hair colours are permitted
- Girls may wear one small plain ear stud in the bottom of each ear lobe gold or silver only
- Girls may wear one plain, flat ring
- Girls may wear a watch
- No other jewellery may be worn unless approved by Dean
- No makeup may be worn
- No nail polish may be worn

NOTE: Tattoos must not be visible when wearing school uniform including sporting/PE uniform.

Boys Uniform

- Navy school shorts or school trousers
- Blue school shirt
- School jumper or school jacket
- Black flat sandals (back strap compulsory) or black polishable shoes with school socks (no boots, sports shoes, or casual shoes)
- Plain scarf: Black, White, or navy

Boys: Hair and Jewellery

- Hair styles for boys need to be neat and tidy and off the face
- Only natural hair colours are permitted
- No piercings
- Boys may wear one plain, flat ring
- Boys may wear a watch
- No other jewellery may be worn unless approved by Dean

NOTE: Tattoos must not be visible when wearing school uniform including sporting/PE uniform.

PE Uniform (Boys and Girls)

PE Uniform is worn during PE periods only or as directed by school staff. Appropriate sporting footwear to be worn.

- School PE t-shirt
- School PE shorts
- School cap
- Sport shoes and white ankle socks
- Girls are permitted to wear exercise tights as part of the PE uniform. These are to be below the knee and a solid colour in black or navy blue.

Lost Property

Middle School students are expected to take care of their own property. Please ensure items are clearly named/labelled.

Mufti Day Expectations

Please refer to "Student Presentation" on page 15

- Mufti days are often fundraising opportunity for Senior School mission trips. Students are to present in clothing that supports modesty, non-offensive language and symbols, without restricting participation in everyday school activities (example PE)
- Low cut tops, shoestring singlets and indiscreet shorts and trousers are inappropriate clothing for school
- Only natural hair colours are permitted

House Day Expectations

- Students come to school in their house colours
- ALL House colours only: T-shirt and or dress up items in house colours otherwise PE gear if competing (no jeans or other mufti)

School Sports Days Expectations

- KingsWay School PE shirt OR House coloured T shirt and school PE shorts for competing *Dress up in house colours also permitted (e.g. tutu, socks, capes, wings)

Swimming:

- Girls: wear one-piece swimming costume (alternatively a rash shirt can be worn)
- Boys: swimming trunks or board shorts no day wear shorts (e.g. PE shorts or cut-off jeans)

Other

HPV Vaccine (Gardasil 9) for Year 8 Students

As a part of the Waitemata District Health Board's (WDHB) school based immunisation programme Year 8 students (boys and girls) will be offered the Human Papillomaviruses Vaccination (HPV).

Parents and caregivers are welcomed and encouraged to attend an information session for students held early in 2022 (date yet to be advised). A WDHB public health nurse will present this session with sensitivity and at an age appropriate level. It includes a brief explanation about HVP and the vaccination, followed by a short video. The session will conclude with the opportunity to ask questions. The below link will take you to the video that will be shown to the students: http://goo.gl/aRF1A1

Parents and caregivers who do not wish their child to attend this educational session should notify their form teacher closer to the time.

Every Year 8 student will be given a form to take home; this form will need to be completed and signed by a parent or caregiver and returned to school whether consenting or non-consenting to the immunisation.
