Introduction and Rationale of the Year 11 Preparatory Qualification

Since the inception of the NCEA in 2002, KingsWay School has committed to delivering all levels of the NCEA qualification. We have consistently delivered results well above the national average and old comparative decile rating at all NCEA levels. However, KingsWay learners almost exclusively progress to Level 2 and leave secondary education with either Level 2 or 3 NCEA, including University Entrance (UE); hence the value of the NCEA Level 1 Certificate in the KingsWay context as a final qualification is limited.

The Ministry of Education's (MOE) decision to adjust the roll out of the NCEA change programme has further diminished the value of Level 1 NCEA for the following reasons:

- 1. Lack of alignment in qualification criteria between the NCEA Level 1 and 2 qualifications.
- 2. Lack of congruency between refreshed curriculum content and existing Level 2 assessments.

These congruency issues have been compounded further by a lack of consistency by the Ministry of Education in providing materials to support the implementation of Level 1 NCEA. The ongoing timeline and content adjustments by the MOE have also reduced our confidence in Level 1 NCEA.

The School Leadership Team want to reassure our community of the plan to rigorously prepare students for success in Level 2 NCEA in 2025. We believe that:

- The refreshed curriculum and Level 1 NCEA qualification will not sufficiently prepare students for success in the existing Level 2 assessments in 2025.
- Our Senior School staff have a proven track record of successfully preparing students to achieve success in existing Level 2 NCEA assessments. The existing Level 2 NCEA standards continue until 2025.
- Our leadership team has the knowledge and expertise to refine and develop an academically stimulating and rigorous preparatory programme that will enable students to succeed in existing Level 2 NCEA assessments.

Consequently, the Executive Leadership Team, with the school board's full support, agreed on implementing a preparatory programme to replace NCEA Level 1 in 2024. This programme safeguards the content, learning, and assessment necessary to continue to prepare students for success at Level 2 thoroughly.

The Year 11 Qualification will include:

- 1. Stimulating and rigorous learning and content that will equip learners with the skill set for success in Level 2 in 2025.
- 2. Opportunities for formal assessment and recognition of achievement.
- 3. NCEA literacy and numeracy requirements, through the co-requisites.

We will continue to ensure the Qualification includes existing opportunities such as:

- 1. Opportunities to accelerate and support learning based on learner readiness.
- 2. Education outside the classroom excursions within curriculum areas.
- 3. The enriching cultural and special character programmes.

YEAR 11 SCHOOL LEADERSHIP

The Executive Leadership Team (ELT) oversee whole school functions, such as ensuring seamlessness between Years 10 and 11.

The operational leadership and management of the Year 11 programme is overseen by the Senior School Leadership Team (SLT), led by Mr Daniel Bennett.

Each learning area is overseen by an experienced Head of Faculty (HOFs). These HOFs have the knowledge and experience to prepare students for success at Year 11 and beyond.

Four Senior School deans oversee Years 11-13, support wellbeing, and restoratively address behavioural issues.

The Director of Learning Support oversees students with specific learning challenges requiring additional support.

The Head of Faculty of Pathways oversees Gateway programmes and careers advice.

The Director of International overseas the International students.

Christian Special Character

We expect an increased time commitment from Junior Secondary students to achieve success. The programme includes preparation for exam readiness in Year 12.

We will support and expect all students to achieve their literacy and numeracy co-requisites by the end of Year 11. The Qualification seeks to equip students with the necessary literacy and numeracy demands required for Year 12 and 13.

Clear Benchmarks, Assessment and Reporting

Students and parents can expect timely and valuable progress reporting. Year 11 teachers provide regular formative and summative feedback to ensure there are no surprises and the next steps of the learning journey are clear.

Key Competencies

The New Zealand Curriculum identifies five key competencies: thinking, relating to others, using language, symbols, and texts, managing self and participating and contributing. The ongoing mastery of the key competencies is essential to ensure students' success in life and academics. Teachers organically include age-appropriate key competency knowledge, skills and aptitudes in their teaching programmes. However, all aspects of the Qualification and school programme encourage a growing exposure and mastery of the key competencies.
